SUMMER NETWORKING TIPS

Many of you are currently participating in a summer job or internship. This means you have the ability to successfully network with those you come in contact with. Consider the following tips to get you making those long -lasting connections that may

prove helpful later.

1. Get Outdoors: Many are under the impression that networking can only occur at a formal business event. This is far from the truth! Say yes to outdoor events this summer and strike up conversations. Chances are, people are more relaxed in an outdoor setting. Read <u>here</u> about a recent story of two teenagers who met Virgin Group founder Richard Branson and pitched their business idea to the billionaire at a charitable event. The result? Branson and co-founder of Insight Venture Partners invested \$I million dollars in their website idea! You better believe that those teens were prepared to network!

2. Do Your Homework: Chances are your workplace is working on a project. Learn all you can about it. Research the topic, sit-in on meetings if you can, and learn who is participating in the project so if you get a chance to speak with any of them, you can speak knowledgably about the project and impress them. Plus, when you write follow-up notes after you leave the workplace and return to school, you can ask specific questions about the project. This will demonstrate how invested you are in the organization's mission.

3. Nurture the Relationships You Already Have: Don't forget to remain in contact with people in your network. Connect them with people you think they could benefit in meeting, invite them to an outdoor event, or write them a note to update them on your recent ventures.

4. Volunteer: Review your resume and determine if there are any "holes" in your experience. In other words, determine the areas that you may need to "beef up". For (Continued on page 2)

example, if you hope to become a lobbyist one day and your resume doesn't show that you have helped in lobbying efforts, volunteer for an current campaign or for an organization that needs people to lobby their mission. Volunteering can lead to networking opportunities. Contact the Alumni Services department to help you determine those "holes" in your resume and to help you determine how to fill them by emailing them at alumni@theurbanalliance.org.

5. Initiate the Gathering: If there is someone you don't know to well or perhaps you have had limited conversations and you want to get to know him/her better, initiate a gathering. Make sure to make it clear that you are wanting to learn more about their role in the business or want to ask them questions about their career path so that there is no misunderstanding regarding your intentions. Being a young employee, veteran employees expect for younger people to refer to them for wisdom. Invite them to a cold drink at a coffee shop, to an outdoor lunch, or make sure to sit next to them in the lunchroom.
